**Eskom Western Cape Resumes Actual Meter Readings**

Eskom Western Cape will resume with actual meter readings towards the end of November 2020 for both urban and rural conventionally metered Small Power Users (SPU). This is to give our valued customers an accurate account of electricity usage.

Eskom has for an extended period not done actual meter readings. Customers' electricity usage has been estimated based on historic consumption patterns. Meter reading contractors will visit customers' premises to read the electricity meter in order to obtain an actual meter reading.

As Eskom's valued stakeholder, we would like you to partner with the utility in sensitising your respective communities in terms of the above-mentioned actual meter readings. As one of Eskom's key stakeholders, through your support and facilitation we can successfully execute the actual meter readings within the various communities.

Customers are advised that the first actual meter read may result in an unexpectedly higher or lower bill. Eskom acknowledges that a higher bill could have an impact on your household expenses especially during these tough economic times. **Arts and Culture**

The City of Cape Town's Arts and Culture Branch invites applications for funding from Arts, Culture and Heritage organisations and institutions located within the municipal boundaries of the City of Cape Town.

Proposals should focus on providing creative and innovative cultural programmes and/or services through arts, culture and heritage that:

1. develop youth (those up to the age of 35 years) to be positive role models and improve their sense of self-worth (through e.g. leadership, creative excellence, tackling social issues, identity, self-esteem);
2. provide youth with skills that contribute to personal growth and career development, including practical skills as well as transferable skills (e.g. communication, team work, problem-solving);
3. introduce youth to career possibilities in the arts, culture and heritage sectors;
4. promote social inclusion by fostering an understanding/appreciation for cultural diversity that is relevant to a specific community or place; (through e.g. different art forms, cultural or heritage practices)
5. help support and build communities by addressing social challenges in innovative ways (e.g. substance abuse, bullying, gender-based violence, LGBTQ);
6. increase opportunities for up-skilling of emerging creative practitioners;
7. provide a response to Covid-19, exploring relevant issues (e.g. loss, vulnerability, stigmatisation, togetherness);
8. engage with environmental and sustainability concerns including challenges around climate change;
9. expose youth to the sector to foster an appreciation for the arts and cultural diversity, with the aim of building larger cultural audiences; and
10. build audiences in the arts, culture and creative sectors through alternative methods and platforms (accounting for social distancing regulations).

**Applicants to note that the branch aims to maximise its Return on Investment (ROI) through a collaborative funding model which will include a skills transfer component and project output alignment to the IDP and business objectives.**

All applicants must have a proven track record of relevant project management experience of no less than two years. Applicants must be realistic when drafting their proposals as funding is limited and the City will not fund entire proposals. Funding will be distributed between the four City geographical areas. Not all applicants will receive funding.

Proposals for Grants-in-aid must be made in writing on an official application form (available from ALL sub council offices and online - [www.capetown.gov.za/grants-in-aid](http://www.capetown.gov.za/grants-in-aid)). Project proposals must be confined to municipal responsibilities and further the strategic aims of the City as set out in the IDP, Economic Growth Strategy and Social Development Strategy, as well as support the City's endeavours to build an opportunity city, a safe city, a caring city, an inclusive city and a well-run city.

When preparing their budget applicants should take note of the Grants in Aid Policy, which is available on request or from the City's website (above).

Applicants should be registered as a non-profit organisation (i.e. NPO, NGO, Section 21, Trust, etc.) and must supply all accompanying documents as specified in the Required Documents section.

Please take care to read the application form thoroughly, and allow time to complete all forms and prepare all supporting documentation.

## APPLICATION FOR GRANT-IN-AID FUNDING 2020/21: SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT AND ECD

The City of Cape Town's Social Development and Early Childhood Development (ECD) Department invites grant-in-aid applications from registered organisations located within the municipal boundaries of the City of Cape Town.

**AREA 1 - NORTH** comprising the areas of Mamre, Atlantis, Cape Farms, Malmesbury Farms, Durbanville, Melkbosstrand, Minerton, Brooklyn, Maitland, Pinelands, Langa, Kraaifontein, Observatory, Cape Town, Sea Point, Camps Bay, Hout Bay, Fisantekraal, Bothasig and Edgemead

**AREA 2 - EAST** comprising the areas of Kuils River, Blackheath, Blue Downs, Khayelitsha, Macassar, Eersterivier, Somerset West, Stellenbosch Farms, Strand, Gordon's Bay, Sir Lowry's Pass, Wesbank and Mfuleni

**AREA 3 - CENTRAL** comprising the areas of Goodwood, Epping, Parow, Bellville, Elsies River, Delft, Airport, Bishop Lavis, Manenberg, Gugulethu, Hanover Park and Athlone

**AREA 4 - SOUTH** comprising the areas of Constantia, Noordhoek, Cape Point, Muizenberg, Retreat, Philippi, Mitchells Plain, Newlands, Rondebosch, Firgrove, Ocean View, Fish Hoek, Lavender Hill, Mowbray, Claremont, Bishopscourt, Tokai and Westlake

Applications should be focussed on providing creative and innovative programmes or services that address any of the following:

**1. Youth (young women and men between the ages of 18 and 25)**

- Provide gender awareness and sensitisation
- Promote healthy relationships between young men and women through joint programmes
- Gender-based violence awareness and prevention
- Encourage completion of education and back-to-school incentives
- Provide sustainable employment opportunities for young people
- Youth leadership
- Mental health issues among young people (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), trauma/violence/depression)
- Education and skills training for the youth
- Entrepreneurial support for young people
- Provide non-financial entrepreneurial support training (3- to 5-day workshops) for young people that will enable them to understand how to survive amid COVID 19 limitations

**2. Early childhood development (ECD)**

- Provide practitioners to address improvement in the learning and teaching environment in ECD facilities by addressing mental health issues amongst children and practitioners, and the use of innovative learning tools
- Provide training workshops for ECD practitioners on mental issues - targeting children and those working with children (the 35 City-owned ECDs are excluded)
- Provide training workshops on ECD learning that are COVID 19-friendly and on the use of innovative resources that are accessible

**3. Gender-based violence (GBV)**

- Provide support to victims of GBV in finding alternatives (financial or otherwise) to prevent or lessen the chance of victims returning to the perpetrators
- Provide social entrepreneurship training to those persons with disabilities who are able to work and unable to survive on social grants

**4. Persons with disabilities**

- Raise awareness and sensitisation on disability
- Raise awareness on abuse and neglect of persons with disabilities and where and how to report abuse and neglect
- Promote healthy relationships and caring attitudes between persons with disabilities and their families and community members
- Provide training skills and social entrepreneurship
- Provide support to persons with disabilities who are unable to access services to health care facilities, social services, education and humanitarian relief

**5. LGBTQIA+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, questioning, queer, intersexual, asexual, +)**

- Raise awareness and sensitisation to LGBTQIA+ issues
- Raise awareness on gender-based violence (GBV) and referral services
- Promote healthy relationships and caring attitudes within communities
- Encourage the promotion of dignity and self-respect
- Provide access to immediate psycho-social support
- Provide support to the LGBTQIA+ community who are unable to access services to health care facilities, mental health services, social services, education and humanitarian relief

**6. Street people shelters**

- Provide shelter-based accommodation and services to street people
- Raise awareness on the issues faced by the street people
- Promote services and support available to street people

Applicants should note that the department aims to maximise its return on investment (ROI) through a collaborative funding model which will include a skills transfer component and project output alignment to the IDP and business objectives.

Proposals for grants-in-aid must be made in writing on an official application form which is available from all subcouncil offices or online at [www.capetown.gov.za/grants-in-aid](http://www.capetown.gov.za/grants-in-aid).

Project proposals must be confined to municipal responsibilities and further the strategic aims of the City as set out in the IDP, Economic Growth Strategy and Social Development Strategy, as well as support the City's endeavours to build an opportunity city, a safe city, a caring city, an inclusive city and a well-run city. When preparing their budget, applicants should take note of the Grants-in-Aid Policy, which is available on request or from the City's website.

An amount of R14 108 865 is available for allocation. The minimum amount per application per project is R15 000. Applicants must be realistic when drafting proposals as funding is limited. Not all applicants will receive funding and the City may decide to fund proposals partially and not entirely.

All applications must be accompanied by:

- A copy of the latest, audited financial statements or audit certificate if grant funding was received from the City in previous financial years. The amount of the grant received must be indicated. Where the amount of the grant previously received per project was R50 000 or less, only a copy of the final expenditure report relating to the previous year must be attached.
- A copy of the organisation's constitution
- A copy of the organisation's latest municipal rates and services accounts (if applicable)
- A zero-rated VAT invoice if confirmed as a VAT vendor
- Valid tax clearance certificate (applications will not be accepted without a valid tax clearance accompanying the application)
- Date of establishment of organisation
- Type of organisation (NPO, Section 21 company)
- Details of previous funding by the City
- Details of other funding received from the City for the current financial year
- Detailed description of project to be implemented
- Information on how the allocation of a grant-in-aid will promote job creation and the estimated number of job opportunities it will create
- Detailed breakdown of project costs
- Project start and end date
- A detailed business plan explaining funding proposal applied for

Applicants must read the application forms thoroughly and ensure that they attach all documents that must accompany their applications.

Failure to produce all relevant documentation will result in disqualification of the application.
